

The final judging of the SCT Enterprise Award 2024 took place as planned, despite the unfortunate cancellation of Chatsworth International Horse Trials. We were extremely privileged to have David Evans as judge. David is a world-renowned professional at the highest level, being eventing course builder for the Beijing and Tokyo Olympic Games and two European Championships. He is also one of the world's leading course designers, designing the cross country courses for Chatsworth, Burgham, Blenheim Palace and Cornbury House International Horse Trials. In addition, he is the course builder for Bramham, Blenheim, Chatsworth and Luhmuhlen International Horse Trials. The finalists were Sarah

Hoare (Tyler Cassells Eventing), Jade Wilkinson (Newark Equestrian), Skyy James (Jump Elite) and Bryonie Ellis (Fiona Davidson Eventing Ltd). David said: 'It was lovely to meet four enthusiastic, dedicated, young professionals keen to further their career in the horse industry, they were all of a very high standard. It was an extremely difficult decision.' The eventual winner was Sarah Hoare. Congratulations to Sarah for all her hard work, commitment to learning and business success and the great contributions she has made to support Tyler Cassells Eventing. The Enterprise Award aims to promote apprentices' contribution to their employer's business success. I entered the competition to learn more about the business side of organisation; discovering what makes a business successful. I set out to show an understanding and development in management systems and procedures alongside promotion and communication. However, you could also show contribution of training and developing others, finance fund-raising/sponsorship, or improving facilities/equipment/services. All the entrants had to put together a brief article with photos introducing the yard and areas of the business to promote and improve. From there we had to put together a portfolio including a CV, a description of the organisation, a brief business plan and examples of evidence showing the contributions we made over 4 months. From this I learnt a lot about how the business runs and must run to be successful. It has widened my perspective on aspects I didn't previously need to understand. The final 4 of us were picked to go to Chatsworth to be interviewed by the judge, David Evans - course designer for Chatsworth International Horse Trials and other courses around the world. We had an interview and were asked 4 questions. The questions were designed to make us think about what we had learnt and how we helped improve the organisation over the whole process. After the interviews we went out with David and walked around the venue, asking questions and learning about what it takes to run an event, especially at such a high level. In conclusion, this whole process has opened my mind to the running of these organisations as well as competitions themselves. It has allowed me to join in the team with a wider variety of skills, helping my employer and being able to help my peers. I am very grateful for the opportunities this competition has given me and I highly recommend having a go.

AMY CRITCHLOW - SOVEREIGN EQUESTRIAN





I am a former Level 3 SCT apprentice. I completed my Apprenticeship with Nicola Barry and Chris Smith at Sovereign Equestrian near Glossop in July 2023. Since finishing my course I have gained lots more experience. I have travelled to shows in Europe, gaining experience in travelling the horses abroad and understanding how much paper work goes into moving horses since Brexit. In April we travelled to Lier in Belgium for 3 weeks taking 9 horses. I was a bit intimidated the first day in the collecting ring but as the weeks went on I gained in confidence. The show uses the Equipe App which allowed us to easily navigate when the horses jumped meaning we could be organised and plan our day. We travelled down to Dover on the Sunday, staying in the stables at Parker's for the night, before

setting off to the ferry in the early hours of the morning. We took the ferry to Calais, and on arrival at the port we travelled to the vet check area where the horses, carnets and health papers were checked. After this was completed we travelled three hours to Belgium, to the show in Lier. We arrived at Azelhof on the Monday. Before unloading the horses we had to set the stables up with shavings, hay and water. Once we had got them off the truck we changed their rugs and left them to rest for the afternoon. On the Tuesday and Wednesday Chris exercised the horses, whether that was riding or lungeing them before Trot up on the Wednesday evening. Each week the show ran from the Thursday to the Sunday where each horse would jump 3 times a week. We had a successful few weeks including numerous wins and placings. Along with the day to day stable duties, I enjoyed putting the time and effort into getting the horses ready for the ring, ensuring they were turned out to a high standard. The outstanding

Along with the day to day stable duties, I enjoyed putting the time and effort into getting the horses ready for the ring, ensuring they were turned out to a high standard. The outstanding facilities at Azelhof enabled us to do this very easily. The built in wash boxes meant we could easily bath horses and the large permanent stables meant we could easily groom and tack up the horses. The permanent stables also included automatic water drinkers, however we also provided our horses with water buckets so we could see how much they were drinking to ensure they would not become dehydrated during the periods of high intensity jumping work. We finished jumping on the Sunday afternoon then loaded up and set off to the ferry. We got the 10.30pm boat to Dover and arrived back to the yard at the 5am. We could comfortably do the journey home without stopping as we weren't required to do the vet checks coming back. We made sure to stop and check the horses regularly during the journey back, ensuring they were a good temperature and were showing no signs of colic etc. Our truck has automatic water drinkers in the horse area to allow the horses to drink as they please throughout the journey. Overall I really enjoyed my trip to Belgium. I feel as though I gained lots of experience and look forward to my next trip.

MASTERCLASS WITH WILLIAM WHITAKER

John Whitaker is one of successful showjumpers in the world and has been for over 40 years, competing at 5* level and riding many times at the European and World Championships and five Olympic Games. All horses are produced by John, Louise and Joanne from age classes all the way to 1.50m. We have an assortment of horses at work from stallions to youngstock who I have bee nvery lucky to have been taught how to handle correctly and safely. At

work we have incredibly high standards with the horses so being taught these has greatly improved my attention to detail and I have learnt so much about the care of performance horses. I've groomed at many day shows like Arena UK and Aintree which I really enjoy and would love to get out and do more. I also have been given the opportunity to hack and school some of the horses which has helped me learn how they stay competition ready.
